

ADVOCACY: WHY? WHEN? How?

Why? It is easy to be cynical about politics, especially in this time of extreme partisanship at both national and state levels. Conservatives in Congress repeatedly vote against women having control over their reproductive rights, and presidential candidates make similar promises. The Affordable Care Act (ACA) continues to be under fire. In California we see programs that serve low income residents, many of whom are women and children, underfunded. However, we need to remember that many significant, positive societal changes in the last 60 years came about because of strong advocacy efforts on the part of many individuals and groups, including AAUW: Medicare; major environmental protections; women gaining rights over their bodies, including the right to a legal abortion; women outnumbering men in college; a woman presidential candidate, to name just a few. Real progress is still possible, with patience and hard work. We, as intelligent, educated women working together, can help make progress on today's pressing issues and prevent society from slipping backward. You can help make a difference!

Why Now In California? AAUW CA is part of The Stronger California Advocates Network, a collaboration of advocates working on legislation to advance the economic security of women in California. Over a dozen bills are moving through the legislature that will help meet basic needs and provide better income support, achieve fair pay and working conditions, support workforce development, encourage asset building, and ensure work- family flexibility and access to quality child care. AAUW CA members can support the passage of these bills and urge Governor Brown to sign them. Sign up for AAUW Action Alerts and respond!

Why Now Nationally? One of the most important elections in our lifetime is coming up in 2016, when a new President, new Senator from California, and members of Congress will be elected. Where do the

candidates stand on issues important to women, such as assuring the right to make decisions about their bodies, retaining the Affordable Care Act, supporting a strong system of high quality public education? AAUW CA branches soon need to consider how they can help register and educate voters, and get out the vote.

How to be an Advocate? Whether ACA, Equal Pay, Immigration, Education Funding or other issues are of concern to you, become informed. AAUW offers resources at both the national website, www.aauw.org and the state site, www.aauw-ca.org/publicpolicy where you can get information and take action. As legislation moves forward, use Action Alerts to let your elected representatives know your position. Sign up for Action Alerts on the national website to be notified when action is needed. This will also enroll you for AAUW CA Action Alerts. *Get to know your legislators*. Members of Congress and state legislators are in their **home** offices often in the last 3 months of the year – visit them, taking a copy of the AAUW CA Public Policy Priorities which you can print from the state website. Remind them that you are an informed voter! Remember: You have no chance to help bring about change if you assume you have no chance! Be part of AAUW California's collective voice demanding equality for women!

AAUW National Convention 2015 Great Success

The local host committee, consisting of AAUW members Donna Lilly, Cathy Burciaga, Eunice Christensen, and Jane Niemeier was happy to host the AAUW National Convention in San Diego in June of 2015. The results of two years of planning and working with the national office paid off with dividends! Hats off to the national staff Ryan Burwinkel, Deepti Gudipati, Matt Eddy, President Patricia Ho and CEO Linda Hallman who found the speakers and organized the workshops and other activities.

In 2015, there were 1004 attendees as compared to 732 in New Orleans in 2013. There were 20 speakers, 46 breakouts and 21 roundtables (9 speakers, 55 breakouts, no roundtables in 2013). Members in 2015, gave \$14,600 to the AAUW Fund and volunteered for 655 hours. The staff in Washington, DC is tabulating the evaluations, but the first comments that they have seen have all been positive.

AAUW CA was well represented with over 300 attending including our President, Kathleen Doty, and most of the AAUW CA directors. Some of our members also presented workshops and roundtables.

There were many wonderful moments, but one of them was when former Tech Trekker, Rae'Bel Neary, presented a bouquet of flowers to Tech Trek Founder, Marie Wolbach at the "Women and Girls in STEM" session. One of the most inspiring speakers was Juanita Johnson-Bailey, the 2015 Eleanor Roosevelt Fund Awardee. She spoke of the obstacles she has overcome first of all as a woman and second of all as a woman of color. She has worked to convince young women that "Gender is still as issue."

If you go to the national website, you will be able download the workshop and presentation information to use in your branches. I hope that you plan on attending a national convention in the future, perhaps Washington, DC in 2017!

We are excited to announce the formation of the Los Angeles Chapter of the Younger Women's Task Force (YWTF). YWTF, a movement begun in 2004 by and for younger women to fight for social justice, became

an affiliate of AAUW in 2013. "YWTF – powered by AAUW" is an opportunity for us to reach that demographic that often alludes our branches: the under-40 professional woman.

YWTF chapters are each unique to their area and members' interests. They might collaborate on events with other organizations in their community. They may have monthly meet ups with other young professionals. They might staff a community event. The underlying goal is to give younger women an avenue to be activists on issues of importance

to them. Networking with like-minded individuals is a key benefit. The issues they work on and care about fall under the AAUW mission.

What YWTF is NOT is a way to drain younger members from our branches. They are not going to

replace our AAUW branches. YWTF chapters will provide a path for new branch members by bridging the gap between college and university student affiliates and AAUW branches. Three separate AAUW entities working towards the same end, working and learning together, and keeping our mission at the forefront of all

that we do.

BACK TO COLLEGE!

It's that time of year! Colleges and universities are alive with activity. An ideal time to make an appearance at your local college/university partners. Remember that the e-affiliate members can be a good base for starting a student chapter on your college/university partner's campus.

A great opportunity for refreshing the AAUW image is to have a booth at your college/university partner's orientation day. Most orientation day events highlight the local clubs and services that are available.

Last year, AAUW Marin had a booth at Dominican University and signed up 31 e-affiliate members for national membership. Remember that every undergraduate student at your college/university partner is eligible for a free e-affiliate national membership, but he or she must sign-up. AAUW Marin recommends that you have a sign-up sheet and have the students sign up on the spot with the appropriate information rather than having them sign up online themselves. Tell the students you will register them with the national organization so they will get their e-mailed newsletter and information on other benefits.

AAUW Marin added a sticker (using an address label as the base) on the front of the "AAUW Student Membership" brochure, saying "Dominican is an AAUW College/University Partner. This entitles you to FREE E-AFFILIATE MEMBERSHIP. See details inside on signing up." This is necessary since this brochure is used for both college/university partners as well for non-partners. They also added an insert with the "6 REASONS TO JOIN."

If you do not have a college/ university partner, the "AAUW Student Membership" brochure can be used for non-partner colleges and universities also. However, national membership for undergraduate students at non-partner colleges and universities is \$17 per year. For graduate students, it is \$18.81 per year.

C/U Chairs – SAVE THE DATE – Thursday, September 10th at 3:00 PM PST- Webinar "Orientation for C/U Chairs." It is free. Sign up on the national website. Go to "Issues" then "Campus." While you are on the website, take a look at the schedule for three other C/U

related Webinars in September. "Student Organization 101 - How to Bring an AAUW Student Organization to Your Campus" Webinar is on Tuesday, September 8 from 3:30-4:30 PM PST.

Another activity for this time of year is visiting your local college/university partner representative with the latest brochures and articles from AAUW. Check out the national website for the available materials. Give the representative a portfolio with separate sections on student loans, sexual harassment, safe campuses, Title IX, gender pay issues, women in STEM, etc. This helps the college/university representative buy into the mission of AAUW and gives her or him supporting materials to use on campus.

In April 2015, UN Women launched its flagship report "Progress of the World's Women 2015-2016: Transforming Economies, Realizing Rights" (available at http://progress.unwomen.org/en/2015/pdf/UNW_progressreport.pdf).

Globally only half of women participate in the labor force compared to three quarters of men. Women's earnings averaged 24% less than men. South Asia has the world's most skewed gender wage gap. Millions of women are still consigned to work in low paid, poor quality jobs, denied even basic levels of health care, without access to clean water and decent sanitation.

A CALL FOR CANDIDATES

The next election for positions on the AAUW CA Board of Directors will be held following the annual meeting at the biennial convention in April 2016. The voting period will be April 16 to May 6, 2016.

We seek candidates for AAUW CA secretary and six director positions. The job descriptions for these positions can be found in Article VI and VII of the AAUW CA bylaws, available on our website www.aauw-ca.org in the Forms & Documents section under Governance. You must be an AAUW CA member in good standing to qualify as a candidate.

You must submit the following nomination documents electronically, attached to an email message sent to nominating@aauw-ca.org.

- 1. Candidate Information Form. Use the form available on the AAUW CA website, www.aauw-ca. org, in the Elections section. Save the form on your computer, complete it, and attach it to your email message. Include information about your AAUW experience, employment, and skills.
- 2. **Statement of Goals**. Submit a statement of goals not to exceed 75 words. It will be posted on the state website, and published with your photo in the winter issue of *California Perspective*.
- 3. **Photo**. Your photo should be in color but black & white is acceptable. The *California Perspective* is published in two versions: on-line full color and mailed black & white). It should be no smaller than 2" x 2" and no larger than 8" x 10" to include full head and top of shoulders. It will be printed no larger than 2" square, so your head should be centered in the frame and occupying half to two-thirds of the frame. Avoid shadows on the face and distracting backgrounds. Digital graphics files (jpg, tif, etc.) are preferred. Please send the photo as a separate attachment to your email message.
- **4. Acknowledgement of Campaign Rules**. Use the form available on the AAUW CA website in the Elections section (also in the AAUW CA Policies &

- Procedures). Save the form on your computer, complete it, and attach it to your email message.
- 5. Video Speech. While not required, each candidate is encouraged to create a 2-minute video campaign speech. Post your video on YouTube, copy and send the embedding code to nominating@aauw-ca.org. Videos will be posted on our website in the Elections section and will also be linked to the online ballot.
